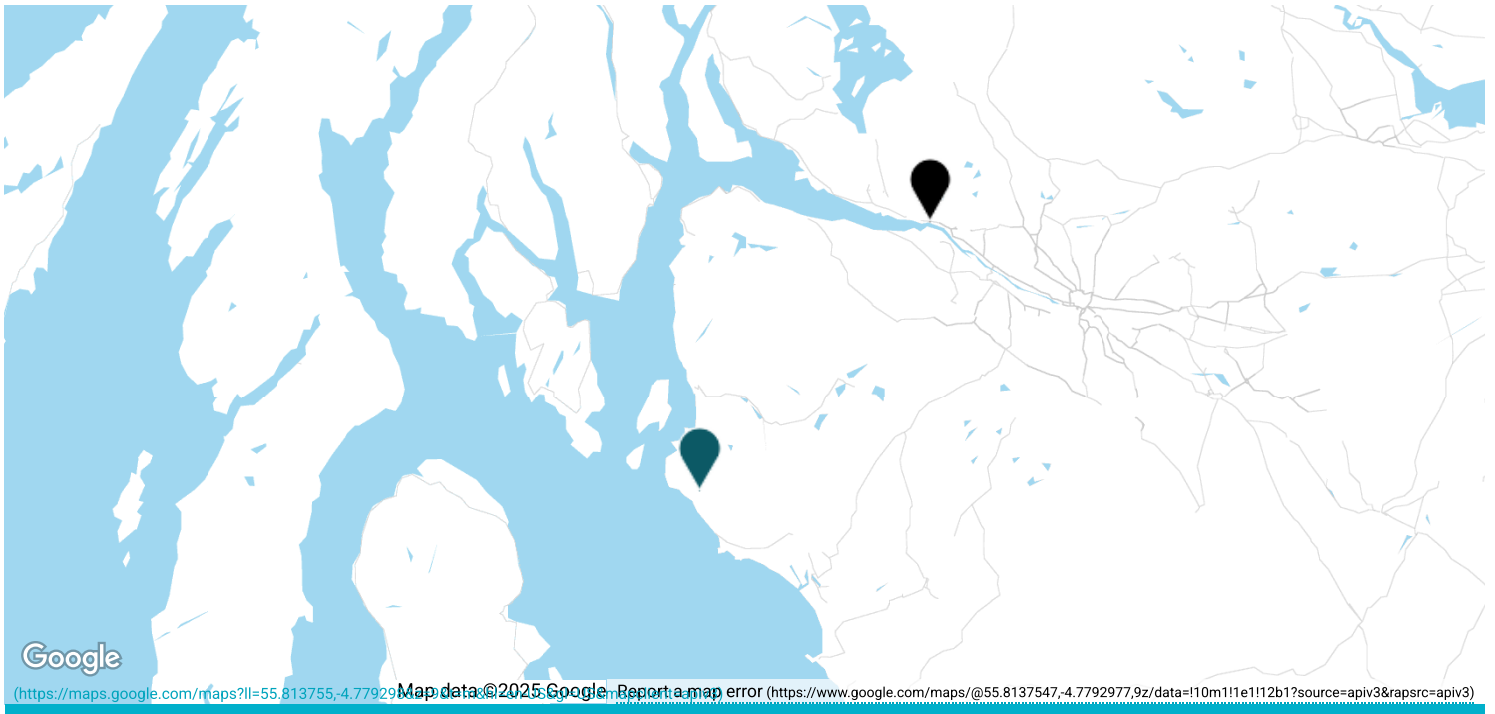




Bowling and Old Kilpatrick

WEST DUNBARTONSHIRE

POPULATION **4,763**

Bowling and Old Kilpatrick is in West Dunbartonshire. Originally a Roman Fort at the end of the Antonine Wall it would be later located on the Forth and Clyde Canal and be at the end of the Erskine Bridge. In the 18th century it was sustained by spinning and weaving. In the early 1990s it saw further expansion with new housing. The town is highly accessible by train to Glasgow and Clydebank as well as to Renfrewshire.

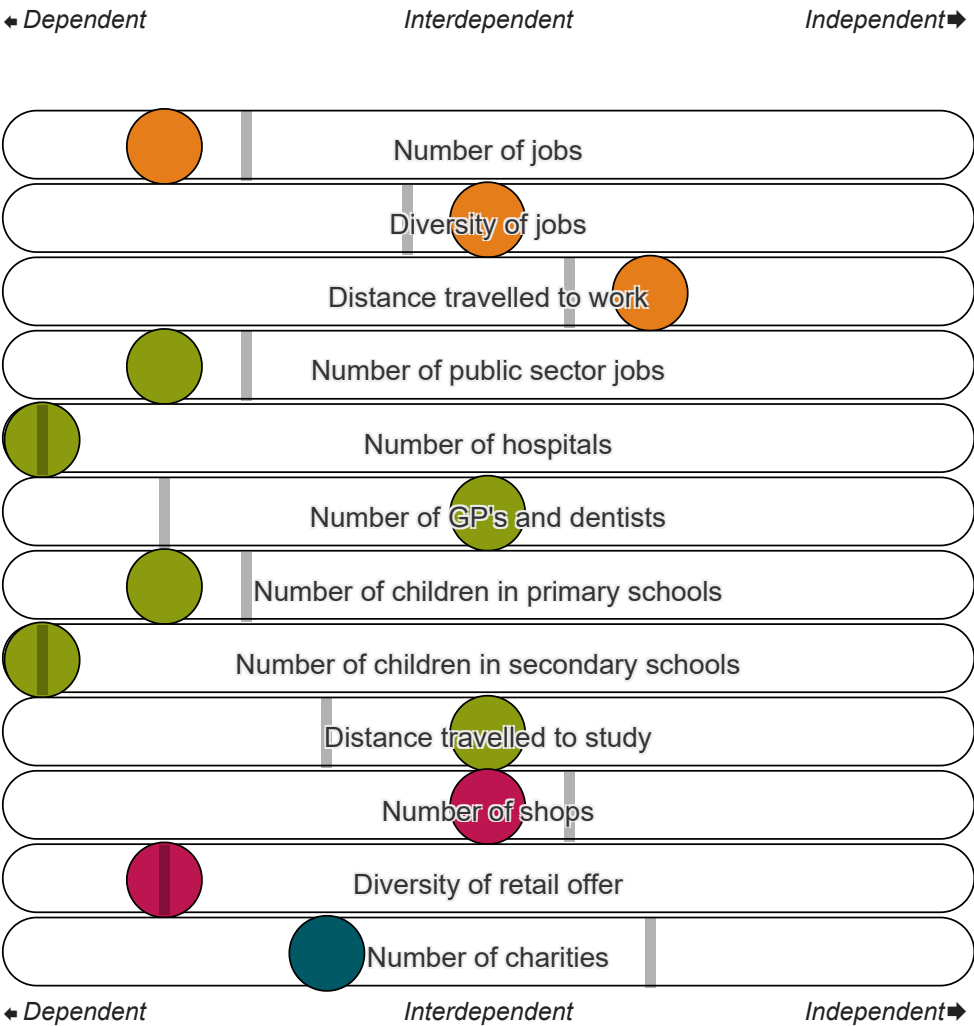
In medium towns such as this, the population is typically older. The group has higher social grade status than other groups, a higher proportion are owner occupiers and car ownership is also higher.

Bowling and Old Kilpatrick is a dependent to interdependent town.

Bowling and Old Kilpatrick is a **dependent to interdependent** town.

Combining inter-relationships and typology, Bowling and Old Kilpatrick is grouped with 2 other towns. It also has similarities in the diversity of jobs, the distance travelled to work, and the distance travelled to study.

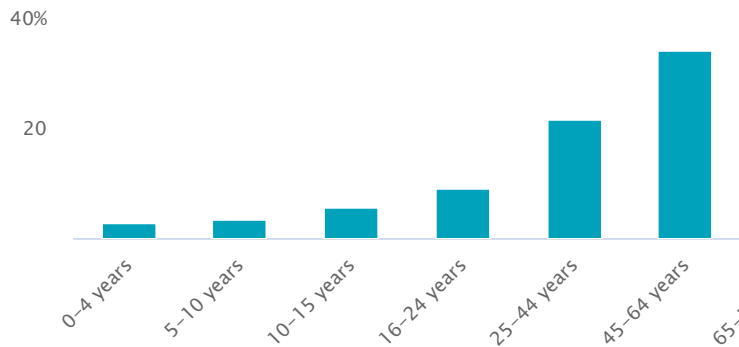
It differs in terms of the number of GP's and dentists. Bowling and Old Kilpatrick differs most from its group in the number of charities.

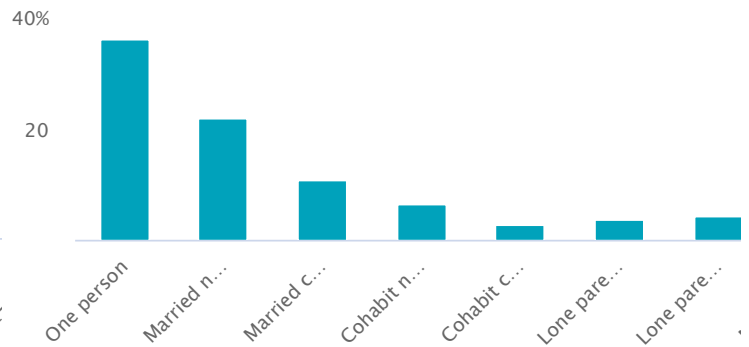

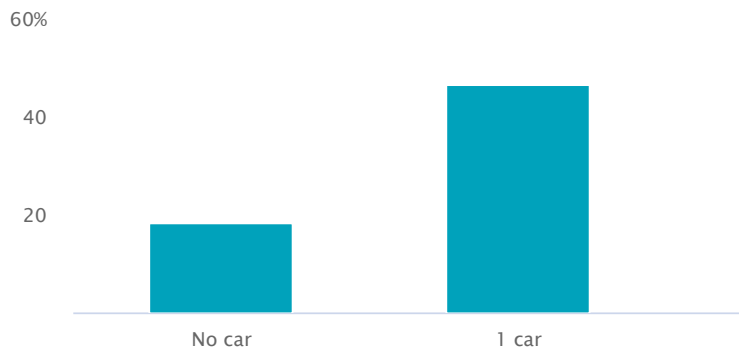

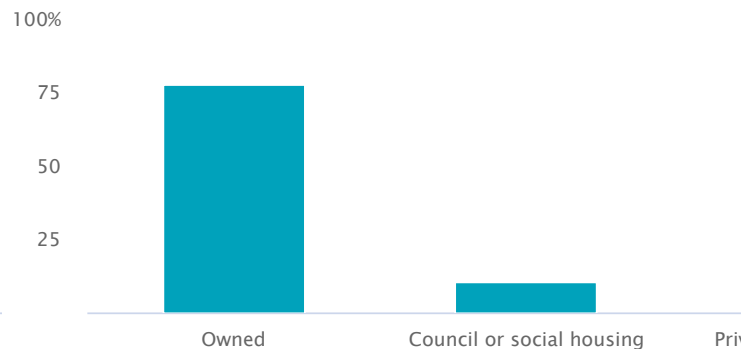
Household composition

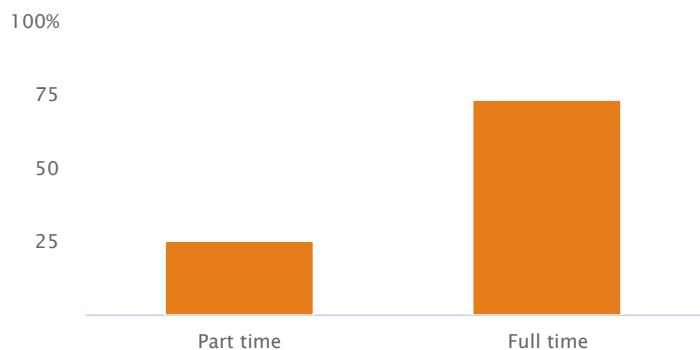

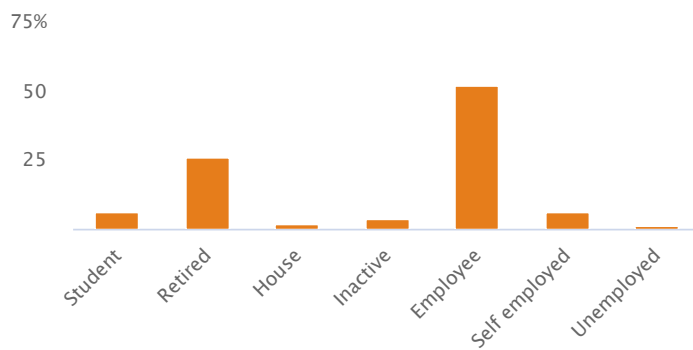
Employment type

(% working full time vs part time aged 16-74)



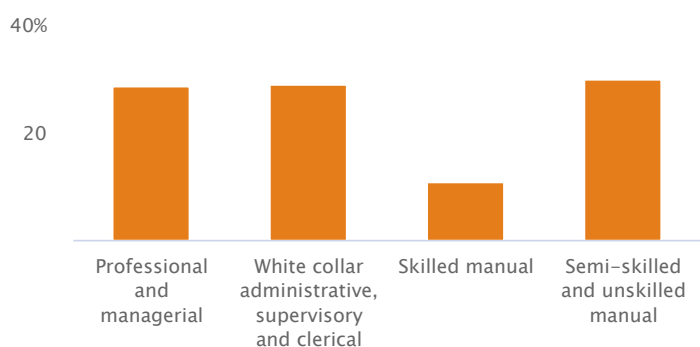
Occupation

(% aged 16-74)

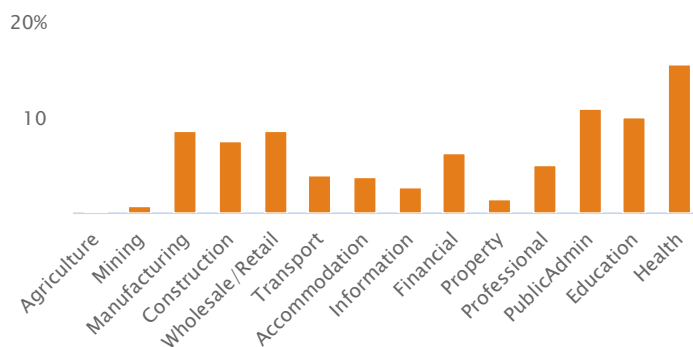


Social Grade

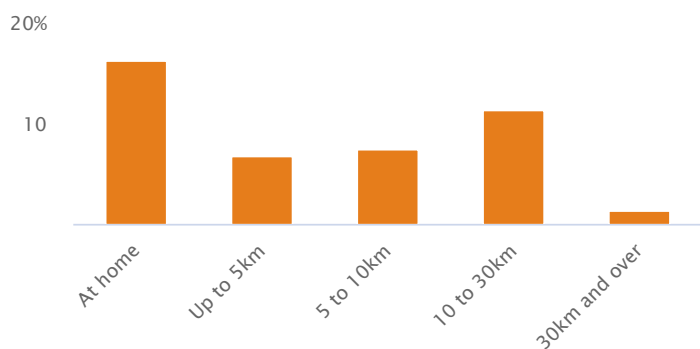
(% households aged 16-64)



Sector Diversity

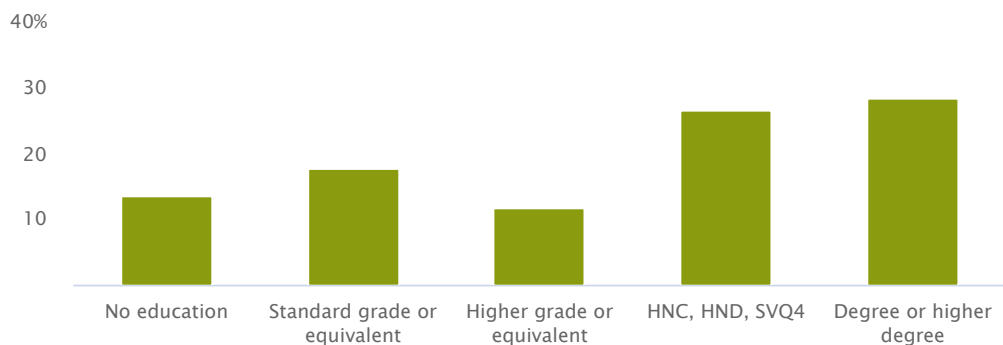


Distance travelled to work

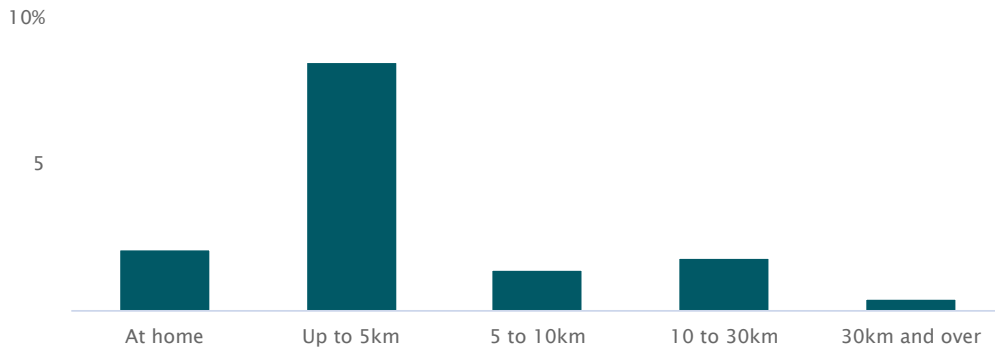
