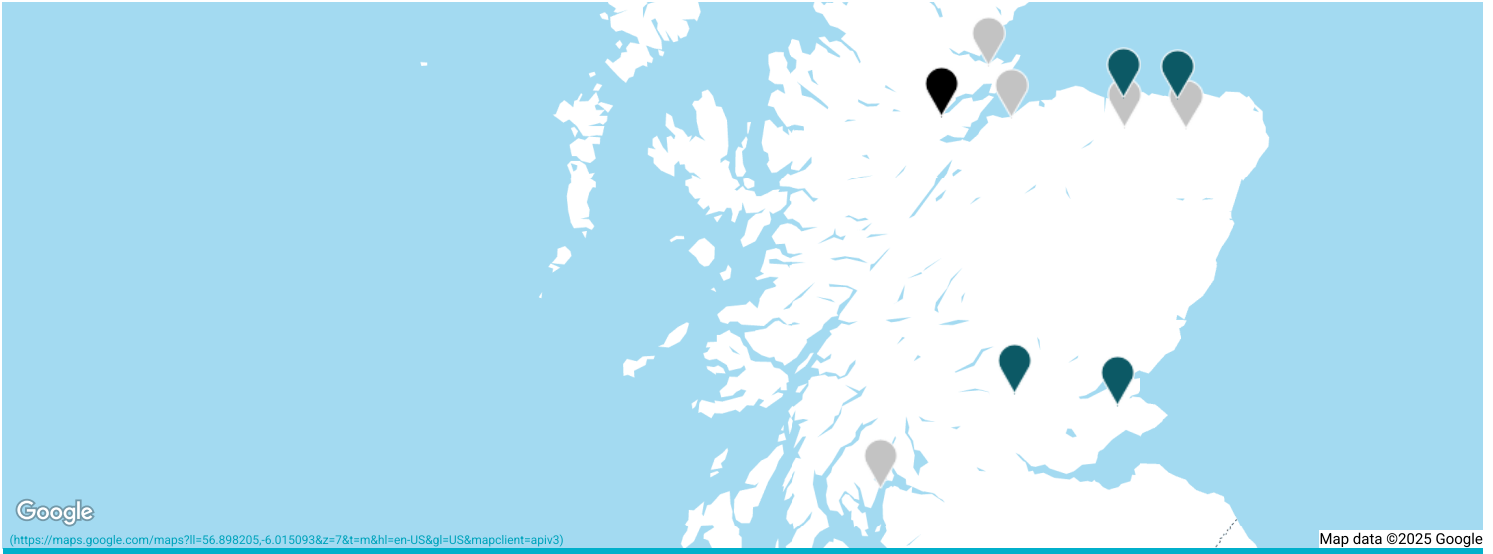

Dingwall in Highland was formerly the administrative centre for Ross and Cromarty. It is Scandinavian in origin the name meaning 'meeting place'. It is a historic burgh. There is employment in oil related jobs. Highland Theological College has opened a campus in Dingwall as part of UHI.

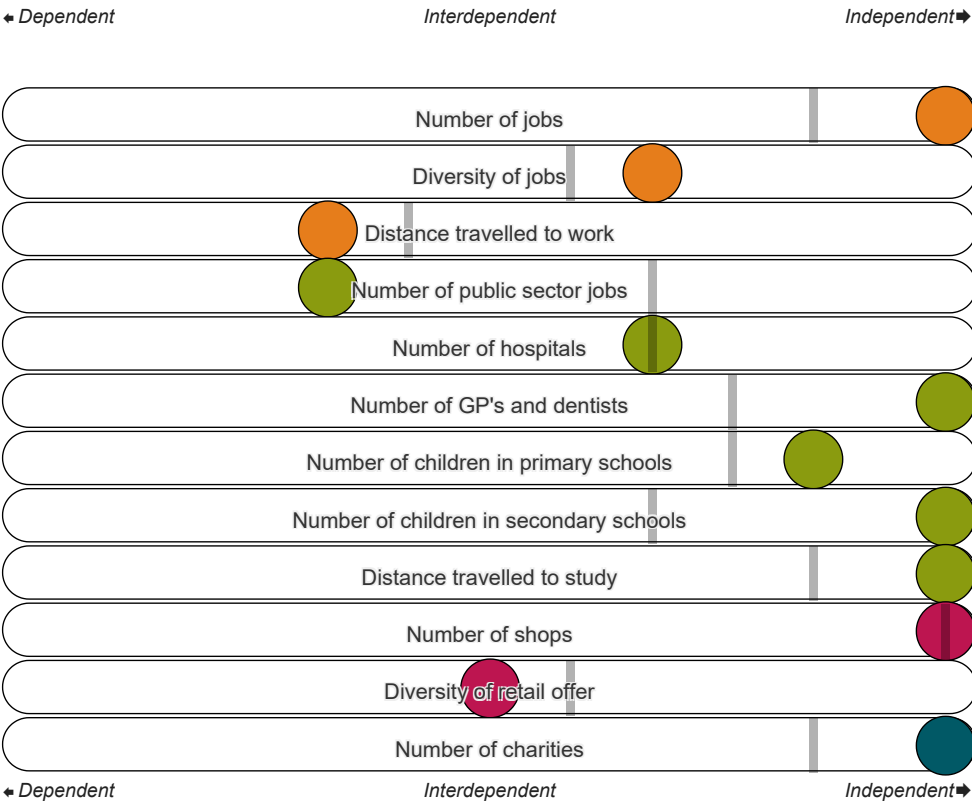
In this medium town, population includes older people, some still in work often in less well paid sectors. It also includes a significant inactive population, some in poorer health. There is a higher proportion of single households and car ownership is lower.

Dingwall is an independent to interdependent town.

Dingwall is an **independent to interdependent** town.

Combining inter-relationships and typology, Dingwall is grouped with 11 other towns. It has similarities to these towns in terms of the number of charities, hospitals, children in primary schools, shops, and diversity of retail offer. It also has similarities in the diversity of jobs, the distance travelled to work, and the distance travelled to study.

It differs in terms of the number of children in secondary schools. Dingwall differs most from its group in the number of public sector jobs.

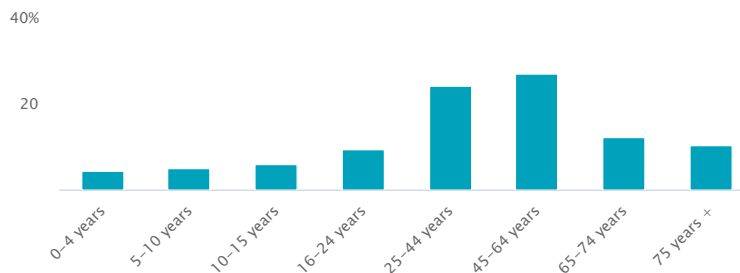

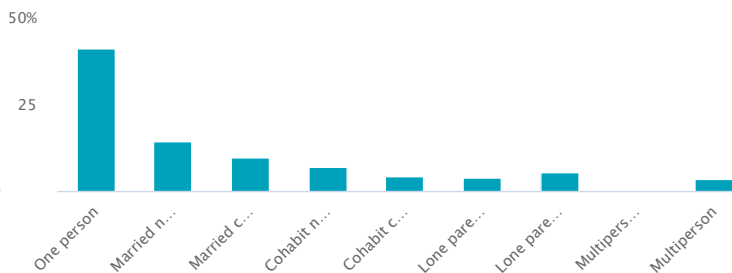

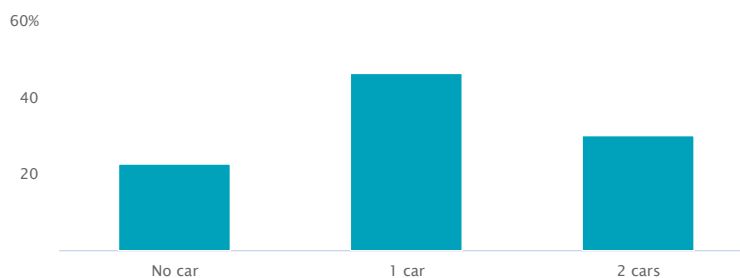

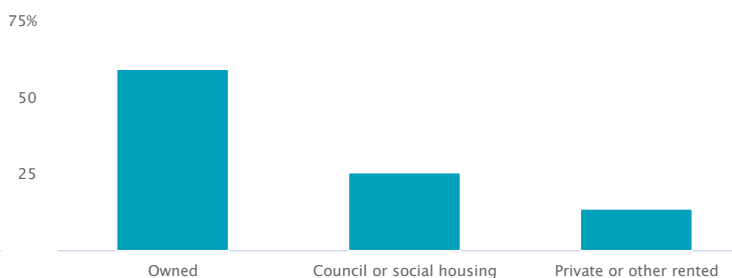
Household composition

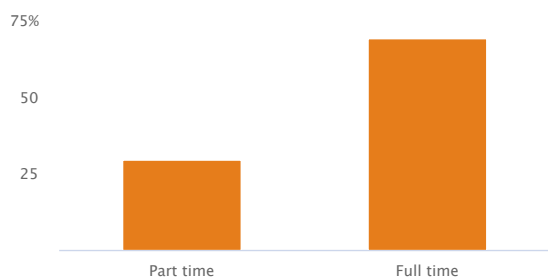

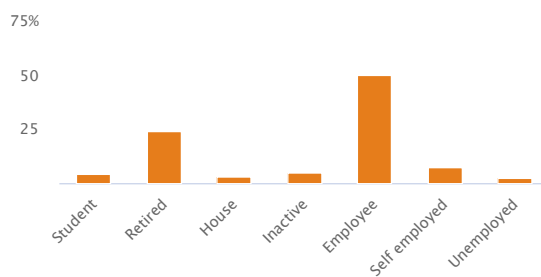
Employment type

(% working full time vs part time aged 16-74)



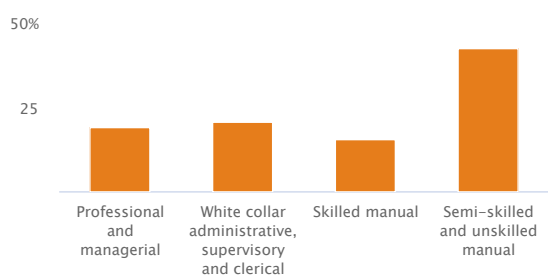
Occupation

(% aged 16-74)

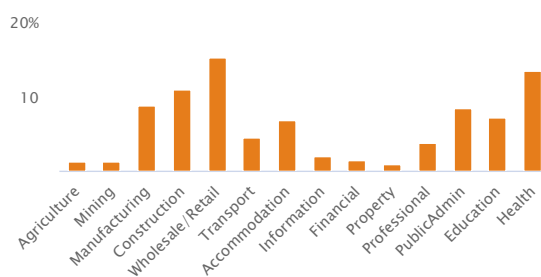

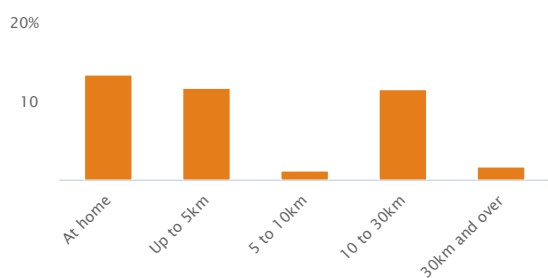
(% households aged 16-64)



Sector Diversity

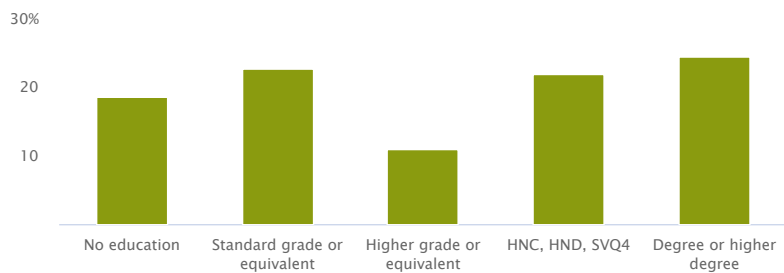


Distance travelled to work

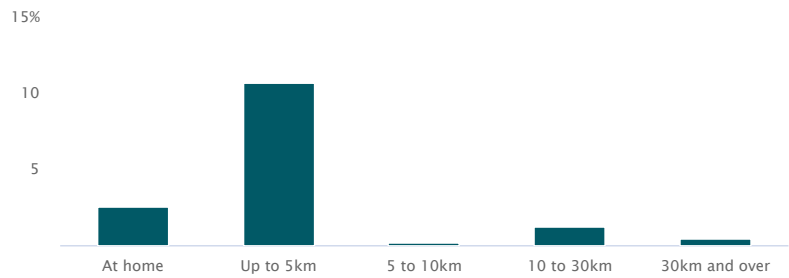
